Initial greeting, FOIPOP Report [Topic 1]

Cst [REDACTED] arrived at [REDACTED] residence, [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] met Cst [REDACTED] inviting him inside where he explained he now lives with his mother [REDACTED].

At this time [REDACTED] walked past Cst [REDACTED] throwing her hands in the air stating "I'm like an Ostrich, I just put my head in the ground and ignore everything, I have no idea what he goes on about".

Actual audio transcript [Topic 1]

Speaker 1 [00:04:10] Have you heard all of this before?

Speaker 3 [00:04:11] No, not all of it. Just some of it. I don't know, but I don't like anything. I'm like an ostrich. I bury my head in the sand and I don't want to know anything. Okay? I'm 86 years old, and I'm not here to hold on to stuff. Okay? I want it to be removed from that.

Evidence, Investigation and next steps, FOIPOP Report [Topic 2]

Cst [REDACTED] had began the introduction explaining the role of police, jurisdiction and rules of laws and re-iterated this again. Cst [REDACTED] asked what was currently happening or had been happening since [REDACTED] moved to the jurisdiction of Halifax in February 2022. [REDACTED] advised nothing had actually occurred and that he just does not know what to do. Cst [REDACTED] addressed the remaining concerns Mr [REDACTED] had before providing the lack of evidence for a continuing investigation. [REDACTED] stated he understood this and was happy with

Speaker 1 [00:46:23] It's a frequent topic, so you've got beautiful evidence.

Speaker 2 [00:46:27] Yeah, I agree.

Speaker 1 [00:46:29] And what I do, I remember you on the phone saying how frustrated you were because you've got all of this evidence and the jurisdiction is probably your biggest stumbling block. The stumbling block? Yeah. Because, yes, what happened in B.C. definitely attributed to what happens here. Yeah. Especially in the online world, because there is no real geographical reach. Yeah. Yeah. I can talk to someone in Korea right now, but yeah, the notification piece is very important.

Speaker 1 [01:08:20] What we should do, all right, because we don't know if this is going to happen anymore or not. Yeah. In Halifax. Yeah. I think you should send me the PDF. Okay. I think I should do as full a report as I can. Yeah, I think I should liaise with my cybercrime section. Okay. And walk through with them. We'll they'll get a copy of my very detailed report about my notes and. Okay. What we spoke about. And then if they want to see the pdf, I can forward it to them. Okay. Yeah. They might have a different opinion on it as a reason that officers have training in different areas. Yeah. Yeah. Sexual assault officers. We have fraud officers. We have cyber crime officers. I'm an everything officer. Yeah. I come in, I collect information on the front end and it goes generalist. Yeah, yeah, yep. Yeah, yeah, that's right. Yeah. Right. So I have a little bit of experience at a lot of things. I don't have expert experience in any one thing.

So I'll probably conclude our interview there or reading it just because you and I spoke back and forth here for a fair amount of time. Yeah. I don't have anything else to offer right now. Okay.

Speaker 2 [01:09:33] Let's do that.

Speaker 1 [01:09:36] Yeah, let's start there. Okay. Yeah. And what I'll probably do is check in with you each day or every couple of days just to kind of track this. Is that fair or do you?

Speaker 2 [01:11:16] That really underscores, you know, the, uh. Well, not entirely, but a part of this, other than. Other than just, you know, the ethical need to bring these people to justice, uh, if that's possible. And I'm sure it is, if there's willingness.

Speaker 1 [01:11:34] But and that's the other part, too, is that which people. Because we know [REDACTED]'s role in all this. Yeah.

Speaker 2 [01:11:39] Civil litigation. Yeah. Yeah.

Speaker 1 [01:11:41] So don't even open it. I'm just talking about in general, like when we have to name people in investigations or charges, but I'm gonna have to make sure we're certain on identity.

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Fabricating evidence

137 Every one who, with intent to mislead, fabricates anything with intent that it shall be used as evidence in a judicial proceeding, existing or proposed, by any means other than perjury or incitement to perjury is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to imprisonment for a term not exceeding fourteen years.
